MORE ABOUT THE INN

Located two miles inside Pisgah National Forest, between the charming small towns of Black Mountain and Old Fort, North Carolina, the Inn on Mill Creek provides a peaceful respite from the hustle and bustle of life. The Inn has seven contemporary guest rooms, four in the Main House and three in the Lake House. An orchard at the Inn provide fresh seasonal fruit, while the little mountain lake feeds a manmade fountain called Andrews Geysers, which was constructed in 1885 by the Southern Railway Company two miles away in the town of Old Fort.

The Inn on Mill Creek is a National Wildlife Federation Certified Wildlife Habitat and one of a few private properties listed on the North Carolina Birding Trail, Mountain Region. Some birds you might see at the Inn include Whip-poor-wills, Swainson's Warblers, Worm-Eating Warblers, Broad Winged Hawks, Wild Turkeys, Northern Cardinals, Red Eyed Vireos, Indigo Buntings and American Goldfinches...just to name a few. Other wildlife can be observed in the mountains of Western North Carolina, such as deer, foxes and black bears.

The Inn is secluded, but not isolated. Free wi-fi is available everywhere at the Inn, and four guest rooms have satellite TV. Additionally, a scenic 10-minute drive puts you in the town of Black Mountain or on your way to vibrant and artsy Asheville, the largest city in western North Carolina. The town of Old Fort is also close by.

ABOUT THE AREA

Biltmore Estate, Chimney Rock Park and the Blue Ridge Parkway provide many opportunities for sightseeing. Additionally, the area has mountain biking, hiking and waterfall trails, all with varying degrees of difficulty or ease and spectacular views. The Black Mountains contain six of the ten highest peaks in the eastern United States.

The town of Black Mountain has several local shops and restaurants, while Old Fort maintains its rich railroad, pioneer and arts and crafts heritage with museums and a gallery featuring local artisans.
